Running for 22 years now, ArtLife, our unique arts and access program, continued to go from strength to strength in 2012, highlighting the innovation and inclusiveness of Footscray Community Arts Centre.

The Amplified Elephants

Our resident ArtLife experimental music ensemble kicked off the year with Howling Sound, a series of three concerts at Federation Square presented in partnership with The Click Clack Project. Drawing an audience of more than 300 people, the ensemble featured artist-in-residence, James Hullick and drummer Sean Baxter.

In September the ensemble took their unique sound to Japan playing at Extremities: JOLT Japanese Australian Sonic Festival in Tokyo. The tour received strong media coverage in both Australian and Japanese outlets including *The Japan Times* and ABC Radio National's *Life Matters*.

All of You

An interabilities collaboration between ArtLife participants and artists, *All of You*, is a television show produced by ArtLife participants and featuring animation, music and dance. The show seeks a re-branding of disabilities by presenting people with a disability in a surreal comedy context that is slightly subversive and gently political. A Pozible campaign to support the project exceeded its target of \$7200 and allowed participants to engage with new audiences.

Special Features

8 November - 20 December

An exhibition of props, costumes, art and animation from the *All of You* tv show, *Special Features*, opened to an audience of ArtLife family and friends. Artist talks were given by Paul Sunderland, Tammy Delaney and Pamela Debrincat.and audience interaction was filmed to become part of the TV show. The exhibition was also presented as part of the Open Studios program in Melbourne's west on Saturday 23 November.

In 2012, our Indigenous Cultural Program was expanded significantly. We delivered 19- activities, further strengthening our commitment to providing a space for cultural safety and creativity for the Indigenous community of Melbourne's west.

Wominjeka

21 - 22 January

We welcomed 2012 with our second annual Wominjeka Festival of Indigenous Culture, held over two days in January. The unveiling the Brook Andrew mural, *Mark I*, on the warehouse was a highlight of the festival. The result of a commission by Footscray Community Arts Centre and a collaboration with community, the work is Brook's first ever permanent mural. Other highlights included an exclusive three-hour masterclass with Black Arm Band; and a performance of the Idja Dance Company's *Lu'arn*, a piece of contemporary and physical theatre inspired by the traditional Boon Wurrung story as told by Aunty Carolyn Briggs and funded by the City of Melbourne.

Bindjareb Pinjarra

13 June - 16 June

A comedy about a massacre? Absolutely. Presented by Footscray Community Arts Centre, The Pinjerra Project, Deckchair Theatre and Ilbijerri Theatre Company, *Bindjareb Pinjarra*, is an improvised comedy about WA's Pinjarra Massacre. Created and performed by Nyoongar and Wadjella (whitefella) actors, the show demonstrates extraordinary risk taking through its fusion of history, comedy and physical theatre. Forums held after each performance engaged 723 audience members in facilitated conversations to support greater understanding of cultural awareness issues. This performance also marked the beginning of a partnership with Ilbijerri Theatre Company.

Story

3 February – 17 March

Developed as an outcome of the 2011 Indigenous Cultural Program, Story featured six local Indigenous artists working with acclaimed new media artist Emile Zile to develop individual digital stories. The group's goal was to make films that tell important stories from highly individual perspectives. A variety of discussion points, workshop tasks and practical audio visual and narrative training sessions were tailored to suit the group's needs, learning styles, participant's skill-level, rate of participation and personal interests. Tauwurrung Elder, and Footscray Community Arts Centre, Elder in residence, Uncle Larry Walsh, played a central role in anchoring the project's intentions within the broader Aboriginal tradition of oral story telling. The resulting work was exhibited in the Gabriel Gallery.

1 June

Produced by the Centre for Multicultural Youth in association with the Footscray Community Arts Centre, the pARTicipation Forum explored refugee and migrant young people's connection to arts in the community. The forum was attended by 152 artists, arts practitioners, young people, government, funders and arts advisors. The program was comprised of performances, panel conversations, smaller break out discussions and a 'poetic intervention'.

Offset Creative Arts Festival and Exhibition

19 October to 21 October

Presented in association with our major sponsors, Victoria University, the inaugural Offset Creative Arts Festival, was a celebration of the people, history and culture of Melbourne's west. The three day festival provided undergraduate creative arts students with an opportunity to work with producers, event managers and Footscray Community Arts Centre as a venue, to develop skills and industry experience.

The Very West

24 September 2012 - 3 February 2013

A successful partnership with St Jerome's Laneway Festival, The Very West continues to be a launch pad for bands in the west. Following an industry forum facilitated by Richard Watts and attended by over 80 people, we received 28 entries to the 2012 competition. Entries were shortlisted to Indian Red, Pataphysics, Friendships and Misha Grace, Roadgeeks, with Pataphysics taking out the prize at the The Very

The competition is not only a significant part of our partnership with St Jerome's Laneway Festival, but has led to strong relationships with the bands, allowing Footscray Community Arts Centre to offer further professional opportunities through our programming.

Footscray Community Arts Centre continued to grow its Arts and Learning program with early childhood classes and the School Holiday Arts Program proving very successful, with many activities booked out and the Music for Toddlers program expanded from two classes to four per week.

School Holiday Arts Program

Footscray Community Arts Centre's School Holiday Arts Program has grown in 2012 with repeat attendances from kids and their families each school holiday. These returning participants benefit from developing friendships and skills in a familiar and encouraging environment. The strength of the program lies in the design of the 'arts intensive' over the three days and the opportunity for the young artists to experience a range of arts activities with workshops presented by outstanding professional artists. The program was fully booked for most of the year.

Emerging Cultural Leaders Program

The Emerging Cultural Leaders program engaged ten young people from a range of culturally and linguistically diverse communities. Run over 14 weeks, this program included a range of industry guest speakers and mentoring opportunities for participants, assisting them to develop their personal and professional capabilities through their projects, while building relationships with each other, industry and Footscray Community Arts Centre.

Outcomes include Katsuyuke Ishikawa and Dennis Jay Pennalligen producing and presenting breakdance competitions, Ryan Buhagiar's development of a website showcasing arts in the west under the mentorship of Richard Watts, and Efren Pamilacan Jnr and his group Freestyle Academy teaching freestyle dance in schools and presenting competitions at Federation Square under the mentorship of Bec Reid.

Certificate III in Visual Arts and Contemporary Craft

In 2011, FCAC welcomed eight participants into our two-year accredited learning program. Designed to create a pathway into higher qualifications in the visual arts and contemporary craft industries, in 2011 and 2012 the course saw students work closely with tutor Robert Mangion to complete their first year units of study and create work for their graduating exhibition in May 2013, *Paper Covers Rock*.
