

Annual Report 2021

We look forward to their future seasons.

We are proud of this work, and look forward to connecting with community in 2022.

Chair's & Executive Report

Executive Report

We recognise that the arts have the power to create connection and transform communities; and we feel privileged to play a role in this vital work.

After an optimistic start to 2021, we found ourselves responding to multiple lockdowns. The pandemic challenged us on many levels. We know that some communities were, and continue to be, disproportionally affected by health, well-being and economic impacts the virus imposed on our lives. For Footscray Community Arts, this was an important time of reflection, and reminded us of the important role the arts can play in reconnecting, advocating, healing and creating safety.

In the midst of lockdowns and event cancellations, we used this time to undertake a range of future-focussed strategic projects to ensure our communities continue to thrive. One of these projects included a refresh of our visual identity, to amplify the voices and ambitions of our focus communities in a rapidly changing world. With the support of Creative Victoria, we undertook a journey with acclaimed creative agency to revitalise our brand. During the consultation process with community, we heard that acronyms can be a barrier for people to connect with us. So, at the end of 2021, we stopped calling ourselves "FCAC". Our refreshed naming convention of Footscray Community Arts proudly owns who we are, and invites everyone to be a part of it.

2021 kicked off with a suite of ambitious activations designed to welcome audiences of all ages back to Footscray Community Arts for COVID-safe summer creativity. Our summer of programming was the beginning of strong audiences year-round: 2021 saw average attendance per event increase by 76%, compared to 2019. We also saw massive growth in our digital followers – increasing by a staggering 10.4% in 2021.

We warmly welcomed new artists to the precinct through our *RESIDENCE* program, providing in-kind space to artists to create new work; and even more new artists were welcomed through our refreshed flagship Artist Development Programs: *Tarnuk Ut-Banny, Behind the Screens, West Writers* and *Emerging Creative Leaders*. We also commenced development of a new schools program which will kick off in 2022, connecting a new generation of arts lovers to Footscray Community Arts.



We continued to forge ahead with our Precinct Plan project; building awareness and advocacy for major investment into our precinct, underpinning the long-term sustainability of this significant community asset. Working with partners Maribyrnong City Council, the State Government, Ontoit and ARM Architecture, we continued vital planning and business case development to ensure Footscray Community Arts is considered in the context of unprecedented investment in the West, meeting the demands of a booming population.

Our work is not possible without the support of our value-aligned funders, partners, sponsors and individual donors. We were incredibly grateful to again receive organisational support via Creative Victoria's Creative Enterprises Program.

Underpinning our successes has been the passion, commitment and skill of our incredible team. We thank each and every staff member across the business for their generosity and patience as our work has changed in the context of the pandemic. Investing in our dynamic culture continues to be a big focus for us in 2022.

We sincerely thank our artists, members, community leaders, volunteers and Board. Your support for the work we do is grounding, and motivates us every day.

We can't wait to see you again.

Schools Program

The future of our communities belongs to young people, and we know creativity is an important tool in supporting connected, safe and vibrant places to live. Over 2021, we undertook consultation with local schools, educators and young people to develop a new schools program, which will launch in 2022. Our schools program aims to connect students and teachers with artists, to build the next generation of leaders, thinkers, creatives and audiences. Through excursions to Footscray Community Arts, students will connect our artistic program to both F-10 VELS and ACARA curriculum; we will also be supporting teachers by providing them with upskilling workshops to align curriculum to Footscray Community Arts' yearround programs



Rebrand

Over 10 months, we worked with our Indigenous Advisory Group, artists, Board and Staff to develop a refreshed visual identity with some key goals in mind:

- To reinforce our commitment to equity and representation.
- To amplify our unique position as an independent arts precinct in Footscray, and recognise our grassroots legacy.
- To develop greater accessibility and consistency in our visual identity.

Our new brand was launched in November 2021, and activated through a new website and across the precinct. For many, our much-loved acronym 'FCAC' will always remain part of our story. As we invite new communities and audiences to be a part of our orbit, we will proudly own our name:

Footscray: Speaks to place, locality, personality, and the character of the west.

Community: Refers to our relevance to local communities, but also the communities we seek to platform as key makers of culture. We exist for people.

Arts: We elevate the role of creativity in cultural life and celebrate the capacity of art to create a two-way dialogue and ignite change.

2021 Highlights

Visual Art

Unable to present live performance due to gathering restrictions for much of the year, Footscray Community Arts stepped-up its commitment to supporting visual artists with 12 stellar exhibitions punctuating 2021. We took over the Performance Space for Wrapped in Culture – which can still be experienced online – displaying Australian-Aboriginal possum skin cloaks and North American-Aboriginal buffalo robes; and we took artwork outdoors utilising the grounds of Footscray Community Arts with Tamsen Hopkinson's CONNECT.

Photo2021 saw Eye to Eye open our 2021 program, exploring 46 years of womanhood through the lens of artists Julie Millowick OAM and Jody Haines. A rollicking Footscray Art Prize - presented with our partners Victoria University, Maribyrnong City Council and Footscray Rotary - displayed 42 works by artists from across the country. Tender gestures, loud voices by Madé Spencer-Castle and Jeremy Eaton addressed touch and intimacy in all its forms. ArtLife Residency artist, Steven Tran, presented his first solo show, BOLD, as a prototype in the lead-up to his major exhibition at Footscray Community Arts in 2022. The year finished with Hyphenated Projects presenting a transformative and exquisite exhibition for Hyphenated Biennial: The threads we hold together.

Industry Development

Following on from a review and consultation process on our Artist Development Programs last year, we welcomed 76 emerging artists to Footscray Community Arts through our refreshed programs. We launched our refreshed flagship programs: West Writers, Emerging Creative Leaders and Behind the Screens, as well as Tarnuk-Ut Baany, a compelling Indigenous artist development program providing mentoring, workshops and seed funding.

In partnership with Vancouver-based organisations, grunt gallery and The Blue Cabin, we supported a digital residency for four Indigenous culture-bearers from Australian and Canada to experiment with sound, song, language, spoken word and text to connect across distance.

tilde, Australia's only Trans and Gender Diverse film festival, which has been presented in partnership with Footscray Community Arts since 2017, was leant pro-bono support by Footscray Community Arts to undergo a review and consultation process leading to tilde receiving two-year funding through Creative Victoria's competitive Creative Ventures Funding program.

ArtLife

The RESIDENCY stream of ArtLife supports artists that want to work towards ambitious and high-impact public projects. With the support of the State Trustees Community Inclusion Program, artists Esther Tuddenham and Steven Tran launched major creative projects. Having a Disability is Esther's digital re-imagining of her poetry, while Steven launched BOLD, his first solo exhibition. Steven wants audiences to be immersed in his artwork, and this will be made even more possible through funding from the Australia Council for the Arts for the next iteration of BOLD. When Steven heard the news, his reaction over the phone was 'cool!'.

While the pandemic continued to disrupt the general ArtLife program and studio practice, artists continued to develop work in over 230 online workshops, and 320 on-site workshops across visual art, dance, digital art and social enterprise. In November 2021, a community survey revealed the challenges of moving the program online, and the artists' and community members' experience of ArtLife had been negatively impacted by the pandemic. We look forward to rebuilding community connection in 2022.



Strategy: The Precinct Plan

We're proud to be one of Australia's longest running independently operated arts precincts. For nearly 50 years we have enabled social justice through creativity. However, our infrastructure is unable to match the high demand for quality creative expression in the West. In 2021 we continued vital work in planning and advocating for investment which will ensure that Footscray Community Arts remains an integral cultural precinct servicing the booming Western Metropolitan region.

In 2019, we undertook a precinct planning process with the support of Maribyrnong City Council and Creative Victoria to ensure our aging cultural infrastructure could continue to meet demand from artists, audiences and community. This resulted in a Precinct Plan by Parallel Practice – a comprehensive paper identifying key demographic shifts in the West, and how our infrastructure needs to respond.

In 2020, we secured further support to develop a business case to investigate the viability of the most urgent recommendations in the Precinct Plan. Undertaking investment logic mapping with leading infrastructure advisory practice, Ontoit in partnership with Maribynrong City Council, identified an arts pavilion, gallery expansion and improved outdoor amenity as the most urgent and impactful recommendations to progress.

In 2021, we consolidated the Precinct Plan story and concept by developing conceptual render images by ARM Architecture. We also continued modest Precinct Plan recommendations including an upgrade of the Basement Theatre, refurbishment of Henderson House artist studios, improved wayfinding, and restoration of the iconic *Marks I* Brook Andrew mural. We also converted a meeting room in Henderson House into a vibrant new gallery space for emerging artist and experimental ideas.

We look forward to continuing this important work, which will underpin the future of Footscray Community Arts.













Footscray Community Arts continues to track ahead of its retained earnings targets as identified in our strategic plan, while delivering projects designed to invest in the future sustainability of the organisation, including refreshed brand, new website, signage, restoration of Brook Andrew mural and precinct plan business case.

Last years' surplus exceeded expectations due COVID19 related stimulus, \$50,000 of which we originally expected to recognise in 2021, but remained in 2020 due to accounting requirements. We expected to follow the large surplus in 2020 with a deficit in 2021. Careful management of variable costs allowed Footscray Community Arts to minimise loss of self-generated income from venue hire, tenancy, box office and bar sales caused by lockdowns. We were also grateful for the generous support of the Sidney Myer Fund and Playking Foundation, who supported generous commissioning programs in 2021.
